How Aphasia After Stroke Affects the Brain: Research by Dr. Behroozmand

Dr. Behroozmand is a **brain** and **speech researcher** at the University of Texas at Dallas. He studies how strokes affect speech and communication in people with **post-stroke aphasia**.

Dr. Behroozmand's lab has received \$1.7 million from the National Institutes of Health to study this problem.



What His Research Looks At

Speaking is a complex task. It involves **many parts of the brain working together**, including those that control hearing and movement.

In the **lab**, participants say words while hearing their own voice played back to them. The researchers slightly change the sound so it doesn't match what was said. For example, turning "bed" into "bet."

Most people notice the error and adjust how they speak. But **people** with aphasia_often:

- Don't notice the mismatch, or
- · Can't adjust their speech.

This helps the team understand where the speech process is breaking down in the brain.

How Aphasia After Stroke Affects the Brain: Research by Dr. Behroozmand

Tools

To study this, his team uses brain imaging (MRI) to see what parts of the brain are active or damaged.

They also use **computer** models to <u>link</u> speech problems to specific changes in brain activity.



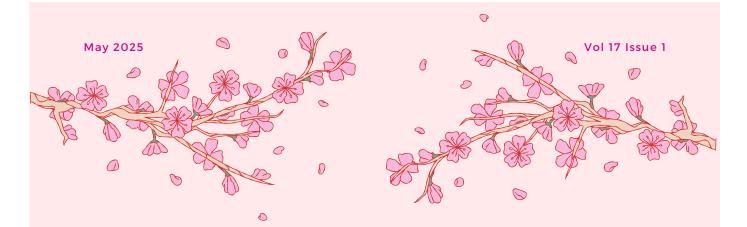


Goals

The goal is to:

- Understand how different types of brain damage affect speech.
- Predict how severe someone's aphasia may be.
- Create better ways to support communication recovery after <u>stroke</u>.

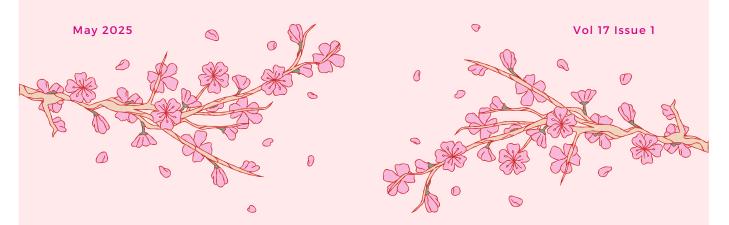
Dr. Behroozmand hopes this research will help **improve treatment and care** for <u>people with aphasia</u> in the future.
